Finally, on Saturday, July 10, the bike rodeo for Troop 336 at Stringtown School was conducted with approximately 20 or so scouts and almost that many volunteers. Again, thank you so much for those who volunteered to make this event a success.

USI Class - Bicycle Basics, Safety, and Touring Darlene Wefel

In June, the Evansville Bicycle Club and USI joined together in presenting a class on cycling. Renee' Hanft, Ann Pendley, Paul Jensen, and Jerry — bike mechanic extraordinaire from Gilles assisted me in presenting information to a group

of nine students over a four week period.

The course was designed for people who are interested in learning about cycling, or beginning in cycling. The nine students who attended ranged from people who were thinking about taking up cycling for

exercise, wanting to start riding and take trips, riders who have been out of cycling for 20+ years, more experienced riders, and USI's bicycle patrol. Their goals differed greatly. Some were mainly interested in the bicycle maintenance aspect of the class. Jerry did an excellent job the first night of class. He pointed out the difference between the different styles of

bikes. He also came back a second time do a quick review and to help with a hands-on tire changing class. Thank you so much Jerry. Your help made this a wonderful class. I learn something every time Jerry goes through his maintenance

Some of the class topics included: choosing a bike, purpose, and fit; what gear you need; how weather affects what you wear; how your bike handles; what every cyclist should take with them on every ride; planning a trip — what to pack, how to pick, and how the routes are marked.

The last day of the class, which was a Saturday morning, we all ventured out for a bike ride. We split into groups — Renee' worked with Marsha, Paul took Anthony and Jack, and I took Jim on routes that fit their abilities and ex-

perience. We used the USI route, but we had some problems along the way. It put all our skills as riders to the test. We had to read maps because some of the markings were gone, a bridge was

under construction and detours had to be made. It was an adventure for all of us.

All of the students did not do the ride due to other obligations and plans. The feedback was positive from all the students. Who knows, this could turn into an annual event.

THE TRAIL JUNKIE EXPLORES PENNSYLVANIA'S OIL HERITAGE REGION Charlie Miller

When we think of oil, images of Dallas and the vast oil fields of Oklahoma come to mind. But the fact is America's very first oil was discovered when Drakes Well was drilled in Titusville, Pennsylvania. The year was 1859 and "Black Gold Fever" soon swept through the Alleghenv River Valley.

Prior to discovering oil, the area economy was based on timber, agriculture, and several small iron furnaces that dotted the river valley. But oil dramatically changed all that. Rural little communities became boomtowns overnight and the men who became rich from oil built mansions in them.

One such town is Emlenton, PA. Nestled on the banks of the Allegheny River, oil prospectors found the area to be rich with oil and natural gas. The Emlenton Gas Light and Fuel Company was the first natural gas company founded in the state and only the third in the entire country. In 1891, a group of local independent oilmen banded together in opposition to the giant Standard Oil monopoly and formed the Emlenton Refining Company. In 1915 the name was changed to Quaker State Oil Refining. The declining supplies of Pennsylvania Crude Oil and other economic factors caused the sale of Pennsylvania's oldest refinery in 1990. Honeywell Corporation continued to operate the refinery for another decade to produce wax-based products, but in 2000 that closed too. Today all that is left of the

once huge refinery are some concrete foundations that nature is slowly reclaiming.

Emlenton, and the other river communities who depended on it, were greatly hurt by the loss of the refinery. Their stores, shops, and movie theaters closed up and the towns started to die.

Today a new form of prosperity is coming back to these river communities with the creation of a bike trail system along the river valley. Thanks to Rails-to-Trails and the Allegheny Valley Trails Association, people are again visiting Emlenton and the other little towns to eat in their restaurants and shop in their stores as they enjoy riding on a truly world class bike trail along the Allegheny National Recreational River. The trail system is impressive with over 100 miles of several interconnecting trails already constructed. There is also a plan in place to connect the existing trails together to form one trail between Pittsburgh and Lake Erie. The once oil prosperous towns are undergoing a new renaissance as they become "Trail Towns".

I began my adventure on the Allegheny River Trail at the Emlenton trailhead where I joined my ride hosts, Terry and Marci Williams. This section of paved trail is 34 miles long and stretched between Emlenton and Oil City. The trailhead features a large parking area with a small gazebo and a shady picnic table. A few hundred feet up the trail passes the site of the



old Quaker State Refinery where it overlooked the Allegheny River from its hillside perch. There is a trail maker located here with an aerial photograph of the refinery as it was in its hay-day. Not far pass this point the trail enters a wooded area and remains that way through out most of its length. Views of the beautiful Allegheny River Valley were visible through the trees to our left and an incredibly beautiful forest complete with several hillside cliffs and waterfalls shouldered us

on the right. The area is also abundant with all kinds of birds and wildlife. I was thrilled to see several Baltimore Orioles in the wild for the first time in my life, and a nice long Black Snake came out to warm himself on the blacktop trail. The river valley and adjacent woodlands are home to many animals including eagles and osprey, deer, raccoon, and maybe some Pennsylvania black bears.

There are two tunnels on the Allegheny River Trail. Both are paved through out with lane reflectors so it is possible to ride your bike




through them, but only with a flashlight or a bike head light, as both tunnels are very dark. We came to the Rockland tunnel at



about six miles up trail. This tunnel is 2,668 feet long and also a little wet with water seepage just inside the tunnel entrance. The water dripping from the ceiling can easily be avoided but is quite cold if you decide to ride through it. On the opposite side of the Rockland Tunnel we came to a trail marker telling us of a old Grist Mill and the Rockland Iron furnace that was once located in the forest nearby.

We decided to ride off trail up a gravel road to visit the site. Although the ride up the hill was a



little strenuous, the results were worth it. We found a beautiful waterfall on Schull's Run Creek that once powered the now long gone mill. We also found the remains of the old iron furnace still intact but over grown with vegetation. The single burr gristmill was built in 1818 by William Greg who powered it with the water diverted from the creek via a dam and water race he constructed for that purpose. The stone lined water race is all that remains of that enterprise. The Iron Furnace was built near the gristmill in 1832. It remained in operation until 1859 running continuously and tapped 3 to 5 tons of molten iron per day.

After playing in the water for awhile we again regained the trail and continued following it up



river to the second tunnel at 14 miles. The Kennerdell tunnel features a nice little waterfall on the right just before the entrance. It is a great place to stop for a rest and just enjoy the nature of the area. The Kennerdell tunnel is the



longer of the two and at 3,350 feet it is approaching 3/4 of a mile long. This tunnel was a little foggy inside but also wonderfully cool on a very hot late spring day. On the other side of Kennerdell Tunnel we also discovered a very popular riverside campground. This area was as far up river as we followed the trail. We began our adventure late and needed to turn around before it got too late. We again passed through the Kennerdell tunnel on our return and stopped on the other side for a little rest and a few snacks provided by my hosts. After a short

rest we began our ride back to



Emlenton retracing our path on this very scenic and beautiful riverside trail. Some day soon I need to return and do all the trails up in this area, and also in the nearby Allegheny National Forest. This is truly a wonderful place to visit and to ride.

Subdivision Scramble: The Subdivision Scramble will start at Dan Krueger's home at 2230 Ridgecrest Dr. at 8:30 pm on Saturday, August 21 (see below for directions). We will ride about 3/4 of a mile to the Keystone Subdivision and ride for one hour. The ride will be treated as a circuit ride (1 hour=20 miles). Once you get to the subdivision, there is no route. You will be free to roam the roads and go wherever you choose. Helmets, as well as front and rear lights, are required for this ride.

Pickin' & Pedalin': This ride was in jeopardy, but thankfully the Cardinal Chapter of the American Red Cross has picked it up. They also run the Town & Country Bike Tour in April. Pickin' & Pedalin was previously organized by Habitat for Humanity.

They've done a great job of running it over the years and we thank them for their service on this event. I spoke to Susan Sauls at the Red Cross about this turnover and she said preparations are well under way. There will still be music at the rest stops and most everything will be kept about the same. She also pointed out that they were the first group to run the event back in its first year. Be sure to be there on August 14th!
